Paris Anthology (English Language and Literature)

You will be given an anthology of texts around the central topic of Paris at the start of the course. The anthology consists of a range of literary and non-literary genres, so it would be a good idea to familiarise yourself with the writing styles and language of the following:

- Travel writing
- Autobiography
- Travel guidebooks
- Internet forums
- Blogs
- Opinion pieces / editorial columns in newspapers
- Adverts
- History texts
- Graphic novels
- News reports
- Letter writing



It would also be useful to understand how Paris is presented in literary and non-literary texts as this will help you understand the ideas and images that arise throughout all the texts in the anthology.
